

St Matthias', St Mark and Holy Trinity **Church Reports** for the **Annual Parochial Church Meeting** 23 May 2021

1. St Matthias Pre-School and Day Care Centre

During what has been the most challenging year for many groups in the church, the Pre-School has been in the privileged position of continuing to meet throughout the various coronavirus lockdowns, apart from a few weeks between March and the end of May. As we went into 2020 our numbers of children attending had decreased noticeably due to various factors, including a decline in the UK birth rate that affected most settings, but during the year, our numbers have steadily increased, largely due to accepting children from the age of 2 years instead of 2.5 years, many of whom would previously have started at other settings, and the Pre-School has enjoyed a fulfilling year.

Of course, the staff have had to be mindful of the restrictions surrounding coronavirus, and parents have been advised not to congregate in the car park, children have been taught how to correctly and thoroughly wash their hands and equipment has been regularly



sanitised etc., all of which has been part of the ongoing daily schedule. Children attending our After School Club, when allowed to operate, were mainly kept in 'bubbles' to lessen the spread of the virus and we are pleased to say that, during the pandemic, we have not had a known case of the virus either among the children or the staff.

The outside play areas have been greatly used this year and the children have enjoyed various activities such as cooking, using tools, learning about different wildlife and plants, as well as good, old fashioned play in an area of the grounds ideally suited to this.

The Management Committee has continued to meet on zoom to support the Pre-School staff and our Treasurer reports that financially, although 2020 has been a challenging year, due to help from the government in the form of the Furlough Grant scheme, we have been able to retain all our staff and to supplement the 80% grant received with money from our own funds in order to continue paying their full salaries.

We are grateful to Liz, our manager and all our staff for their commitment and dedication to the children.

We have been sorry to say 'goodbye' to Victoria as she has become more involved in the work she and Stephen are doing in Brixham, but we are glad to have Lena Fearnley, who has volunteered to come in and get more engaged with Early Years and she has been running regular Godly Play sessions and teaching the children Bible stories.

2. Schools, Children, Young People and Families Ministry

SCYP Report 2021

This year the SCYP Steering Group (Schools, Children, Young People and Families) was formed to:

- Drive the process of recruiting a new worker to oversee our ministry to children, schools and families and to lead our young people.
- Keep good communication going between the different areas of ministry.
- Start developing strategic ideas for the future.
- Be a structure already in place with people working cohesively as a group when prospective candidates enquire about the new role of SCYP worker.

Lena Fearnley was appointed as our Children's and Family's worker on a voluntary, parttime basis.

With the Covid pandemic, the year did not pan out as any of us could have expected but amazingly despite very limited opportunities to meet in person, some areas actually managed to grow and every area of the ministry has learnt something and adapted accordingly. Here are some reports from the various children's, young people, schools and family ministries.

Report on Church/School Links

Due to the pandemic our collective worship team has not been able to go into schools to carry out the usual Open the Book assemblies. However we have made a series of videos presenting the bible stories and prayers from our homes, outside and from church. Outside locations have included, our gardens, the coastline and Dartmoor. These have set a real context for the stories told. The videos are collated on the St Matthias Drop Box site and accessible to our three schools, Ilsham, Warberry and Ellacombe. We have received very positive responses to our contributions and will continue with this way of linking children and staff to the word of God.

Alongside this contact Reverend John, Sue Davis and myself are members of the Local Ethos and Governance Committee. Sue takes the lead in safeguarding and special educational needs and disabilities and I am chair of this committee with particular interest in curriculum matters. We have met on line every term and have been kept in touch with how our schools have coped during these unstable times. We hope to be back working in schools as soon as we are allowed.

In addition to our outreach into our local primary schools, we are involved with the chaplaincy team at St Cuthbert Mayne secondary school under the leadership of Rev Nathan Kiyaga. This involves meeting with pupils in groups, as well as 1:1 work and assisting in acts of worship. There was a very successful trip to Buckfast Abbey for the years 7 and 8 with many children showing a real desire to explore spiritual issues and be involved with prayer. Just prior to the first lockdown there was training on bereavement by Rainbows Bereavement Support. During the first lockdown we were able to assist with making up food parcels for those in receipt of free school meals.

Children and Families

As soon as we understood what 'lockdown' was going to mean, we focused on ways to maintain contact with our families and deliver teaching and fun to our children. These have included:

- Delivering packs to all our families - 6 in total, starting with Easter 2020 - containing books, crafts, activities and puzzles, and always some chocolate! The feedback to these has been great!

- Emailing each Friday with the story summary and craft for that weekend's Zone and, in recent months, presenting a 5 minute child focused piece during the service.

- Through YouTube, delivering Godly Play stories suitable for children and grown-ups alike! Started with the' Faces of Easter', then every 2 weeks, a series from the Old Testament through to 'Wondering through Advent', and most recently,' The Colours of Easter'. Whenever rules allowed, getting together. Firstly in the summer holidays with picnics on the Green; at October half term a wild worship Apple Day in the Forest School area; Messy Christmas held over 3 afternoons in order to accommodate everyone - 24 family groups in total, bringing with them 52 children with plans to do something similar for Easter 2021.
At Christmas, 22 children and youth had tremendous fun practising and brilliantly performing the play 'Prickly Hay'. With the restrictions, of course, they could not perform to an audience!

 Planned and trained for launching Begin Well antenatal classes. Our team of Tessa, Jan, Liz, Kate and myself completed our initial training with the view to launching our first course in January 2021 with the support of one of the founders from the charity. Throughout, the support from parents, and of course, the children has been so great for all we have been able to organise.

5. Missions Action Group

The Missions Action Group is a small group of church members who discuss and pray for a range of Christian charities that we recommend to the PCC for support from our annual mission tithe. St Matthias' Church is committed to the biblical principle of tithing, according to which we donate 10% of our voluntary income to chosen Christian charities. We give thanks that the PCC were able to hold fast to this commitment last year, despite the impact of the pandemic on St Matthias' finances. A total of £17,000 was donated in 2020, an increase of £1,250 on the previous year, to charities covering four areas of giving: Local Mission, World Mission, Poverty Relief, and Supporting Churches.

Every year substantial donations are made to six charities: Church Army, Church Mission Society, Church Pastoral Aid Society, Linx, Mission to Seafarers and Tear Fund. In addition, smaller amounts are given to other charities, which vary from year to year. In 2020, the other charities chosen for support were: Christian Response to Eastern Europe, Compass Braille, Mercy Ships, Open Doors, Scripture Union, Torquay Community Larder, WorldShare and Youth Genesis Trust. Each year, the sum of £1,000 is kept in reserve from the tithe to be donated at the end of the year for emergency and disaster relief. Last year's emergency reserve money was donated to Tearfund's Yemen Appeal for humanitarian aid.

On several occasions each year, we welcome speakers from the charities we support to our Sunday services, to share news of their work with church members. This continued in 2020, with speakers being invited to participate in our online services, including representatives of Open Doors, WorldShare, Compassion and Mission to Seafarers. Our CMS Mission Partner, Nicci Maxwell, had been due to travel back from Uganda to the UK and visit us in April, but the pandemic prevented this, so she sent a recorded video message instead, about her work at Potters Village child medical centre. She eventually made it back to the UK in the autumn, but Covid restrictions prevented her from joining us in person, so she once again recorded a video message for us.

We are extremely grateful for the generous giving by members of St Matthias, which enables us to send significant amounts to charities near and far who are showing God's love in action. 8. Home/Study Group

The predictions in the last report of some form of remote contact for Home Group members not only came true but have lasted rather longer than any of us might have imagined.

Several groups have used Zoom for regular contact. (How can something most of us hadn't heard of at the beginning of 2020 become part of the language?) The Watcombe Park group have very much enjoyed studying Mark's Gospel and discovered how much more there is to learn in perhaps one of the Bible's most familiar books.

All groups have kept in contact by at least one of Zoom, e-mail, phone or WhatsApp and have found this a support both spiritually and practically.

Early on the church set up a system to ensure everyone was being contacted either by Home Group members or by a member of staff and had good family or neighbour support. During the last year a number of people have moved away so that most groups are now smaller without the natural flow of new members to join them. Some newcomers to our church are keen to join groups but have very reasonably held back until direct face-to-face meetings are possible. We look forward to them joining groups along with others in the church who have not so far enjoyed this aspect of church life.

We are pleased that one new small group has developed in the last year with half a dozen men from the church meeting weekly to discuss a variety of topics and closing with a reading usually from Psalms.

There may be a place for an ongoing Zoom group for those with children and those with transport issues, and activity groups including a walking group and other activities. The recent Lent course, after an excellent exposition of Nehemiah, built on the lessons of 3000 years ago with some thoughts of the challenges and opportunities coming out of restrictions and how we could refresh our relationships with each other and with God, and build a new relationship outside the church.

Looking to the future, in addition to strengthening existing groups and starting new ones, there are many opportunities to widen the recognition of church groups to include the many groups we have within the church who help us run, from flower arranging to Matts Cats, ToWNS, Social Core, Men's Breakfast and for September 2021 the Torbay Mission in September which is being planned by Through Faith Missions. All these groups increase the sense of belonging which we have realized is so important to our physical, mental and spiritual health. Providing mutual support and publicity would increase their effectiveness and help coordinate their activities.

As the situation rapidly changes, we will keep these ideas fresh and would welcome prayer, ideas and support.

10. The Church Centre

Since March 2020 and up until April this year, the Centre has been much quieter than usual! The Pre-School remained open for much of the year (even in the most recent lockdown) but the office and rooms have been closed for much of the time in line with the various government restrictions – tiers, lockdowns etc. When we were allowed to open we did having made all the necessary preparations – sanitiser, covid signs etc, and we had a small number of loyal hirers who came whenever they were allowed. The exercise groups were the keenest – they wanted to continue to keep fit and even though 'mingling' wasn't allowed, they enjoyed exercising together with long standing friends. Last year and this we have had to operate with restricted numbers to allow for social distancing and consequently we only have 2 of our rooms available for hire (the Lounge and Hall).

As I write this in April 2021 we are starting to open up our rooms again for a small number of permitted activities – academic tutoring for children, 11+ mock exams, ballet classes and on 6 May we will be open for the local elections.

On 17 May, a greater number of activities will be allowed to take place and a number of hirers have booked to return - keep fit, pilates, Brownies, property management meetings, ballroom dancing and a local choir (Big Noise Chorus). A slow and safe start to what we hope will be a more normal year and it's lovely to see people back in the building.

Our Open Church ministry (opening the church to visitors) had to stop for most of the year but when the restrictions allowed, a small team of stewards came together to open the church on Wednesdays for an hour for anyone wanting to come in for a time of private prayer. This is continuing and we hope to extend the opening times.

When the office has been closed to the public, the phone and emails have still been monitored and any church administration has been carried out from home but with regular visits to the office to check on the building, cleaning, post, fire safety etc. I am grateful to Sylvia for her help especially during my time on Furlough and to all others who have helped to keep the show on the road during this last year.

13. Sound & Video

You'll remember that we moved back into the church for all services in January 2020. From April, at least one service was recorded each week, by the clergy, and uploaded to our new YouTube channel, with a Godly Play bible story or another suitable resource, from Lena, for children and families (though valuable for all of us). Church members of all ages have contributed to our services, recording and uploading activities, readings and prayers. Once it was possible to record services in church we quickly invested in the technology to record and later live stream an 11.00 service. Our 'congregation' could then watch live or at a later time of their choosing. Until now our Zone services have been pre-recorded and streamed. We have all come to terms with using new technology and now that we are finally able to worship again in church it will be good to see past members of the sound (and video) team returning to support 'hybrid' worship, reaching our in person and at home

worshipping community. Recently we have incorporated singing outside on the piazza at the start and end of livestreamed services. Could you help with this? There are further opportunities to serve for any who are interested, with training provided. *David and Joanna Wilkinson*
